

REEF ETIQUETTE

- When snorkelling or diving you should not touch, walk on, stand or break live corals. Corals are living animals that provide food and shelter to other reef animals.
- Do not remove anything from the reefeverything has a purpose. Taking live coral or rock with attached marine life is illegal in Hawai'i.
- Fish feeding upsets the natural balance on the reef- introduced food can be harmful to fish. Fish feeding is also illegal.
- Try and observe sea turtles from a distance of at least 20 feet, both on the shore and in the water.
- Dispose of your trash properly- plastics in the water can damage and kill marine life.

REEFTEACH KAHALU 'U BAY

What is ReefTeach?

ReefTeach is a project based at Kahalu'u Bay, Kona that aims to educate visitors on how to avoid damaging corals and take care of our turtles and our reef animals.

Kahalu'u Bay is a very popular snorkel site due to its ease of access and high coral and fish diversity. It experiences over 400,000 users a year – just during peak daylight hours. 40% of these visitors are from the cruise lines and 60% are from the airlines, as well as a small number of locals.

Trained ReefTeachers educate visitors about what corals are, their significance to the reef, coral reef ecology, and the different types of fish and invertebrates in Hawai'i.

In particular ReefTeachers emphasize how swimmers should avoid touching or standing on coral, removing anything from the reef, feeding the fish or harassing the turtles that feed and bask in the Bay.

Data collected by ReefTeach studies show that 80% of those visitors not taught by ReefTeachers will step and stand on coral, some for as long as 300 seconds.

Of those who have been taught by ReefTeachers, only 9% will step on live coral.

You can volunteer as an individual, or through your business or organization. All training is done by en experienced marine scientist.

ReefTeach Volunteers use picture boards, books and mobile reference folders to teach visitors about coral, reef fish, turtles and other reef organisms, and how to reduce their impact on them whilst enjoying the reef.

ReefTeachers also collect in-water data to show that visitors educated about the reef are less likely to impact coral.
